

### On The Road – or How to Pack for a Trip

How did you get all that stuff in your car? We've heard that comment so many times I thought it might be a good topic for an article. Our first big challenge was our UK2K trip to the UK in 2000 and we failed miserably. First of all we took the large rigid suitcases that require a large man and boy to carry after it's loaded. Number two we didn't pre-pack our Healey to see if it all fit (It didn't), and number three we didn't take into account that most of the small hotels we stayed at don't have lifts (elevators). How spoiled we Americans are. Let's start by selecting the right luggage for traveling in a small British Car. Actually luggage is not the proper word. 18" long collapsible duffel bags are ideal. The type you carry your work out clothes in. These are very light and inexpensive. We found ours on sale and they come in many colors. We chose red to match our car. When packed they are lightweight and flexible. You can fit four of them across the fold down back tray in a Big Healey four seater or I can get two in the trunk of my MGB. We usually pack one for our first over night stay in a motel if we are on the road so we don't have to unpack everything for a one-night stay. These soft bags are easy to pack and you can roll up jeans, shorts, t-shirts and pack them tightly. These bags usually have a small end pocket that zips open and are handy for socks, belts and underwear. We try to take as much wash and wear as possible but most motels and hotels have irons/boards. If we find we need to pack a little more formal for an evening out or banquets we take a long a light weight garment bag. We found that shoes are harder to pack in these duffel bags so we usually stuff them in and around our other stuff in the trunk. Once you have these duffel bags situated then you start arranging all the other items around them. We usually carry such things as flashlight, small tool bag, parts and miscellaneous items, extra oil and hydraulic fluid, car cleaning items, etc. Packing efficiently didn't happen over night. We've learned from our many trips we have taken across the U.S. and Canada. We did learn a big lesson on the UK2K trip. Another positive from this trip was I purchased a luggage rack for the Healey from Dennis Welch, while in England. Another option if traveling very far is to agree among you how many spare tires you need to take. Another thing when you return home and find something you didn't wear or need then leave it a home the next time. One of the hardest things to anticipate is the weather. In Texas in the fall you expect it to be cool and you take mostly jeans and it turns out hot and you didn't bring any shorts. The hardest part is packing for two or three weeks or a month. You're just going to have to find a Laundromat which we had to do in the UK a few times. If you're going cross country and staying only one or two night in one location most motels have laundry facilities on sight. The soft-sided duffel bags or sport bags are definitely the answer to getting the most in these small British Cars. I sure don't profess to be an expert but we sure have had lots of experience.

## Tech Article

As I write my articles based on the Peachtree MG Registry newsletter time frame, I am sending this one in a day late. I forgot that I had not written one yet. Or had I and just forgot that I did one already? As I get older, am I forgetting more or did I not know it in the first place. The obvious fact is that I am getting older (as are you) and that is a good thing. More things hurt now than before, like my knees that really hurt when I have to set a car on the lift or get out of a low seat in one of these LBCs. The back has been gone for a long time now do to picking up a MGB short block out of the trunk of a Spitfire when I was just a youngster in my 20s.

Or was it a Spitfire short block in a MGB trunk? Either way, I lifted wrong and it hurts to this day. Some things in my memory bank are still very clear. These past few weeks, I have spent some time with old friends not seen in awhile. The good memories returned as well as some of the not so good. Talking with one of my first customers from over 30 years ago we were going over the 100+ hours we spent just lining up doors on his MGTD we were restoring mostly after hours at my old shop in Marietta.

And today, over 30 years later, that MGTD is still sitting in my storage barn awaiting another restoration, or would that be the completion of the first one. The car has never left my shop! One reason or another, and I know them all, has kept that car at my shops. It has been to each of my locations since I first opened my doors in Marietta. Four times I have moved that car.

Why haven't I ever filed a lien on it? He is one of my best friends ever, he lost some interest in it due to personal circumstances, etc, etc, and I would never do it to him or any of my good friends and customers. If anyone is interested, it is now for sale by him but does need a new rebuild to be drivable.

And why did I open my doors in Marietta? I am not from around here. My birthplace is Savannah, Ga. What brought me here? That would be my cousin, Gary Diamond. We have been friends all our lives and after I was released from the army, he said come meet a neat old guy that has lots of old Triumph parts. That would be Jim Ealy. Then I met Patty. I actually moved here though because Ealy offered me a job at the junkyard paying \$10.00 per day and a \$10.00 bonus if I put a clutch in a car. I made \$60.00 per week. I was rich!!!

Well, Patty wanted me to have a real job before she would marry me so I went to a Triumph dealer, Andy's Sports Car Center, on South Cobb Drive and became their only foreign car mechanic. But Ealy had told me about two "good guys" that opened a new parts store in Marietta and that I should frequent them when parts were needed. That would be Foreign Auto Parts of Marietta, Bill and Bob Palmer.

When Andy's fired me for being too honest with customers, ask me about this if you want more info on it, Bill and Bob let me open up in their basement rent and utilities free. Of course the basement had been the milk dairy where all the local farmers brought their milk in to be sold or turned into butter or ice cream and the doors were not big enough for me to get a car inside so I had to work on my first few cars outside. Did I mention I was released, much better word than fired, from Andy's at Christmas time and it was cold?

Well anyway, one thing led to another and here I am. I just cannot remember what I started out to say. Oh yeah, I was talking about forgetting things and that is what this article is about

I just built a MGB engine and overdrive transmission for a customer. This is something I have done hundreds of times if not more. Or could it be less, I am not sure anymore. So I install it in the car, do all my pre flight tests and routines and finally fire the thing up. Runs great, good oil pressure and temp. For 15 or 20 minutes it idles at about 1,500 rpm to seat the cam and lifters, then I idle it down and look over things.

There is something wrong. A new engine is not supposed to leak oil. Oh, it must just need snugging the bolts up. That is normal after the first run in. Up in the air and I get under and re-tighten every bolt I can reach. I set the valves after retorqueing the head, re-set the timing and idle; it is ready to run again. But my oil leak is still there. Right under the front lip of the oil pan, Why? I had noticed when I took the engine apart that the front of the oil pan had been bent flat (there is normally a little rolled lip along the outer edge of the pan. Look at yours to see what I mean). This was obviously been done so some one could remove the pan without pulling the engine and just stick bearings in it for a cheap rebuild.

I never thought it would hurt anything. Or, Did I leave out the little square cork seal that is supposed to go between the front plate, oil pan, and the block. This is very important for proper sealing. I remember putting in the rear cork seal but I could not remember the front one at all. I usually glue these in with 3M weather strip adhesive to hold them in place. And that stuff gets over everything. But I did not remember putting it in. So I had to drop the pan to check. This can be done from under the car, drain the oil, remove all bolts and tap the pan loose. Also remove the two lower trans bolts to make it easier to drop the pan out.

Did I drain the oil? I forgot, better check. Yes I did this time but I have forgotten in the past where I got to take a quick oil shower. A pan full of oil is like a cookie sheet full of Jell-O. One wrong move and you can be wearing either. Ask my daughter how long it takes to clean up that much Jell-O. Or you can ask me how long it takes to clean up that much oil. But I digress.

The cork gasket was in place and Bill was here to witness it. So, the flat edge was hitting the front plate keeping the pan from seating the gasket properly. They had gooped it with silicone the first time, something I very seldom use. My only solution was to re-roll the lip. The lip gets put back and the gasket replaced and the pan put back on and the oil goes in, and everything is ok. And no more oil leak!

Now, if I had been able to remember if I had put that small little cork gasket in, I might not have had to drop the pan and go thru all that work. But my memory failed me. I used to be able to picture in my mind what I had done to any car I had worked on recently but now all I picture up there is log homes and naked women. Not sure if that is all bad.

I do not know if there is anything you can take to improve your memory, if you know of something let me know, please. Luckily, I do not forget too often and I at least know when to check my own work. Too bad a lot of other mechanics don't. Maybe the mechanic profession would not have such a bad rap. My new motto is: do it once and then think about it and then re-do it right the second time or at least by the third time. My motto used to be I don't care it ain't my car, my car runs. But even that isn't quite true anymore. Still no starter on the V8.

Y'all have a great Christmas and/or Hanuka (however we spell it) and we hope to see y'all soon. Barry
