Not only does the drive give an opportunity to give back to our community, it gives our clubs a reason to explore the small towns and the two lane roads that criss-cross our state. In past years we've visited the towns of Warm Springs, Newnan, Madison. Athens. Cave Springs. Pine Mountain and Lake Rabun. This year, we have had several requests to head back to the northwest part of our state; we listened and have gone a bit farther to make this drive the first inter-state charity drive. We're heading to the beautiful mountain town of Mentone, Alabama.

Just over the state line along the near famous Lookout Mountain Highway is the small artist's colony called Mentone. It's a quiet town, with scenic roadways, expansive vistas, waterfalls, galleries, historic inns, churches and colorful locals. What more could you ask of a mountain town?

What was it?

If you were at the British Motorcar Show at Berry College you may have noticed an unusually shaped small white car. Doing some research I found out that it was a British made car called the Midas.

The Midas was originally built by the D & H Fibreglass Techniques Company of Oldham England. It was powered by a 1,000 cc engine and in 1982 offered the 1.3 ltr Austin Metro engine as an upgrade. The Midas was considered as the next generation Mini Marcos which was used extensively on the highways and was based heavily on the BL Mini. The design for the Mini Marcos was purchased from the Marcos Car company by D & H in the late 70's.

Due to it's extremely strong construction, the Midas was the first composite bodied car to pass the 30mph front end collision test.

The Midas still has a place in the kit car business in the UK, cars are still being produced. The company not surprising is now known as the Midas Car Company.
